his year's garden is part of a French country manor house that was built in 1931 by architect Lewis P. Hobart, known in San Francisco for his work implementing the design of Grace Episcopal Cathedral on Nob Hill. The beautiful grounds of this two-acre estate were designed by John McLaren, designer of Golden Gate Park. In 1925, an authentic Spanish garden was installed in the western garden, the remaining fountain can be seen today. Other original portions of the garden still exist including the Sycamore trees in the back garden and other statues.

Crossroads Park to Implement Green Infrastructure





Crossroads Park drainage issue

reen infrastructure (GI) is an approach to stormwater management that protects, restores, or mimics the natural water cycle to slow down and clean stormwater, and to keep it from overwhelming the Town's stormwater systems. Incorporating GI design into home landscaping and in the community can be a simple and cost-effective way to improve water quality and reduce the impacts of localized flooding in Hillsborough. Examples of GI design measures include bioswales, pervious pavement, rainwater harvesting, and minimizing hardscape.

As part of the improvements at Crossroads Park, Hillsborough Beautification Foundation is incorporating the design of small infiltration trenches to both treat and retain stormwater runoff. From the surface, these trenches will look like decorative rock areas. But these trenches actually serve a dual purpose as surface runoff from paved areas will drain into these trenches and infiltrate through the soil before entering the Town's stormwater system. Additionally, the park's existing pervious features such as decomposed granite pathways, trees, and natural ground cover and plantings all support the goals of GI.
